

Kitchens with baseboard roll-out drawers for wine bottle or cookie sheet storage, built-in cutting boards over trash receptacles and hidden storage below countertop in an island at the sit-down counter location." -Suzy Childress. NAIL THE SCALE

'Start with a furniture plan! Draw out the size of the pieces and where they will go before you shop, other wise the scale and proportion will be off. And in a smaller space, it will be much more noticeable." - Mary Anne Smiley, Mary Anne Smiley Interiors LLC

"Don't go too small with your furniture! You don't necessarily have to have an apartment-sized sofa if you live in an apartment, Small pieces draw more attention to a small space.
