THE DESIGNER: Bryan Yates of Yates Desygn

PERSONAL BEST: Dallas-based Yates says now more than ever, his clients are looking for ways to inject more personality in their spaces, whether it's via a graphic wallpaper, painted walls, or fanciful furnishings. "We've all pivoted into a different eraeveryone was at home for so long—so people are interested in something different. They're all about color, and they're open to taking more chances."

VIEW FINDER: Artwork is a great way to add a little something extra, but don't discount the beauty of the all-natural landscape just beyond the panes. "We had a recent project with a pair of huge windows that brought in a lot of color and ultimately became the backdrop for the room," Yates says.

SMALL WONDER: For those looking to inch their way into making a splash, the designer says, go to the (accent) light. "Try a sconce with a fabric shade that has a little pattern to it. Grandma chic is in now. Bring that into the mix."

FINISHING TOUCHES: Yates likes to use an array of finishes and metals in spaces to create a timeless, collected-over-time feel. "A painted element alongside natural wood adds a little more depth to a space instead of something that's all one note. It's all about adding layers and contrast," he says.

RANGE ROVER: Folks who can't afford a navy or charcoal Lacanche range in their kitchen, for example, can still experience a little piece of heaven while cooking, per Geyer. "A custom vent is a fun, high-impact way to add 'jewelry' to the kitchen," she says. "I hate a boring vent hood. They're almost always the center focal point of the kitchen, so why not do something beautiful and thoughtful?"

COUNTER CULTURE: Don't discount marble when it comes to adding more character to the space. "We're mixing it with metals and different inserts, which can create interesting borders and add to the design," Geyer says. If you have your heart set on taking bigger risks with more graphic tiles,

she says start with the butler's pantry. "We might do a main kitchen that's timeless, but a pantry can be opportunity to get really fun and crazy."

BROAD STROKES: Paint is an easy, fairly noncommittal way to expand your horizons. "If you paint your kitchen island a funky color, and three years later, you decide it's over, that's only a weekend job to repaint it," Geyer says.

bright IDEA: "Lighting is a place where budgets are rarely property allocated, but it's so important and it really transforms a space," she explains. "If you're looking for a quick fix, bring in some drum shades in fun colors."

paper trail: The designer likes to incorporate wallpaper in fun spaces like a lounge, but she suggests considering other alternatives in a hardworking space like a bar. "We're currently using a hand-painted wall covering by Porter Teleo in a project," she says. "You can also try vinyl or a hand-painted paper covered with a thin sheet of glass, and you'll have something that's durable and artistic as well."



UP, UP & AWAY: Clients who are unsure about adding an abundance of pattern should consider papering the "fifth wall," says Connell: "I don't love accent walls, but if you suggest adding a fun pattern to the ceiling, that seems to be more of a comfort level for most people."
